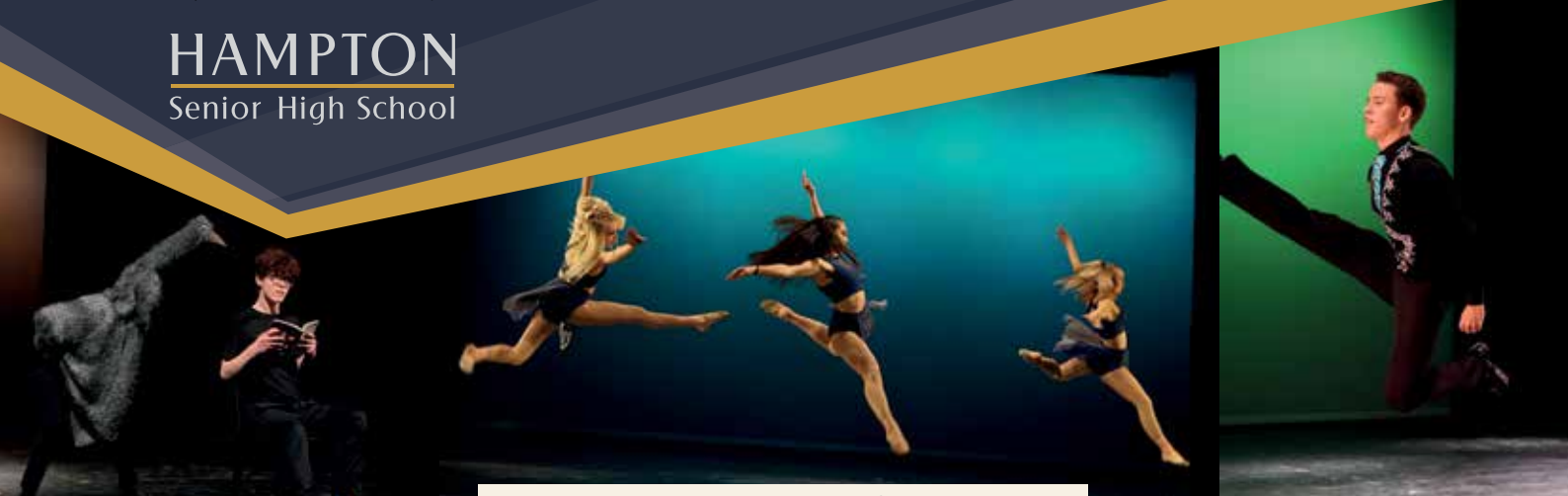

In Week 8, Hampton held its annual R U OK Day activities, led by the Mental Health Working Party in collaboration with our Student Council and the SHOUT student groups. We had a guest speaker talk to our Years 9, 11 and 12 students about building resilience and managing stress like a pro and had a Hero Day where students and staff dressed up as their heroes and participated in lunchtime festivities where they fundraised for Zero to Hero (an organisation that promotes youth leadership in the area of mental health prevention). Students received information about building positive mental health and where to go if they or someone they know is struggling and needs help. They also participated in fun activities with a number of mental health agencies to build their mental health knowledge and identify ways that they as individuals can Act, Belong and Commit to enhance their personal wellbeing. Our Years 7, 8 and 10 students engaged in class group activities to help them learn how to do the key elements of the R U OK conversation with their peers – Ask, Listen and Encourage Action. It was a great day building positive connections in our whole school community and to open up the conversation that we are all here to support each other through difficult times.

Follow the Dream

Students from Hampton SHS, Kiara College and Dianella Secondary College went to Wireless Hill on an On-Country Cultural Learning Excursion in the last week of Term 3. Greg Nannup facilitated the day and showed us many traditional uses of the balga, banksia, zamia, eucalyptus and other vegetation for Noongar people. The uses included a natural chewing gum, fire lighters, water sources, food sources, skin remedies, making damper and many more.

The students saw the environmental indicators of being in the Noongar season of Djilba, and Greg discussed what Noongar people would be doing traditionally in the area during that season. He told the dreamtime story of Joondalup, and the cultural significance to the part of the Swan River we were on. Many Nollamara (kangaroo paw) were in blossom, we learnt the name translated to 'shadow hand' in English. Greg also showed us many traditional tools and their uses. The students then had the opportunity to make their own traditional string out of a river reed.

The Dianella Secondary College students said they made some great initial friendships which we hope will continue on with the Follow the Dream Program.



Bushrangers

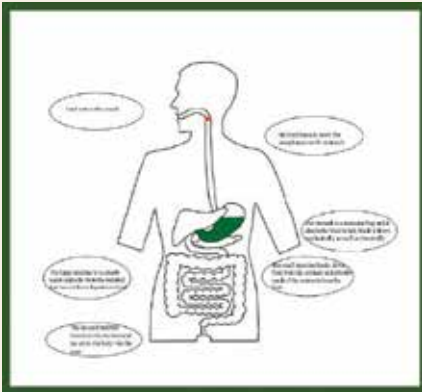

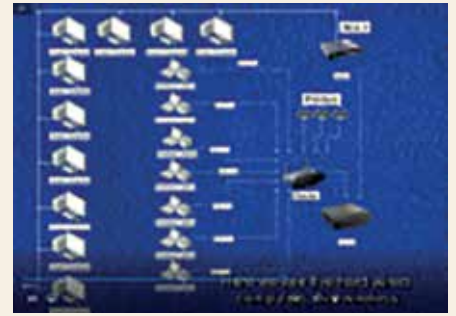
ICT

They designed their personalised drinks coaster, which were produced on the laser cutter. Students also developed an animation for a Science topic using Adobe Animate in the General class.

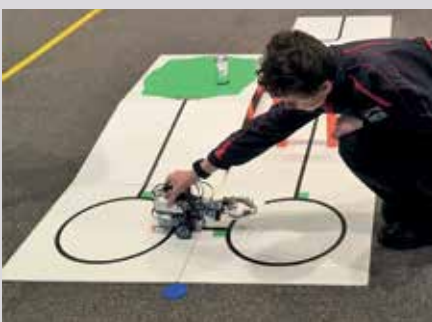


ATAR students designed a website and a video pitch for a business network.

And if you've ever lost your keys, the Safe Pocket device is the Christmas present for you! It will detect the change in weight when something falls out of your pocket.



You might think that the next product is already a common one. Yes, insoles have been around for a while. But custom made insoles using discarded polystyrene materials upcycles

this non-biodegradable product into something useful. Students learned about the process for a local businessman and then used the CNC Router at school (thanks, Ms Butler) to cut out an insole that was a perfect fit.

Geography

Year 12 to Alkimos

Year 11 Chocolate Factories

Students later had the chance to try ruby chocolate and a number of chocolate bars developed in places as far as the Dominican Republic.



D & T

Design and Technology has been busy designing and creating this semester. In metal and wood based subjects an overall emphasis is put on good design, using and maintaining tools and machinery developing new skills and Occupational Health and Safety.

This semester Year 11 and 12 students of Materials Design Technology Wood are creating small tables as part of their portfolio using a range of timbers and machines to create fabulous and useful products. Previously students have created children's chairs and bar stools.

Year 8 students are learning to use hand tools such as saws to create sign-posts with a range of different materials including timber, MDF and plastics. Year 9 students are designing and making storage boxes with hidden compartments and coasters using both hand tools and power tools and machinery. Year 10s have been designing and producing photo frames, key holders and rings.



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
