One team in Year 8 (Up-soles) won the Best Overall Project award



As some Year 9 students have completed the Try A Trade Program we decided to keep the boys learning new skills, interacting with each other and developing their efficacy. We introduced a new program called "The Hampton Shed Men". This program is a five week program running for three periods a week where the students can utilise their skills and learn new ones. Every five weeks six new students will enter the program where they will need to set goals and achieve a project.

Our first project was to render the walls in the student services garden. A mighty fine job was done by the boys with only one day of training in rendering. This project will continue into 2022 to complete all the pillars and create a peaceful student space. The second project is upcycling furniture collected from road-side pick-ups. The students select a piece of furniture and have five weeks to upcycle it. We learnt why people are adamant on the use of helmets and why they help so much, the effects of drink driving and drug driving and how it doesn't just affect you as it is a chain reaction. We also had the opportunity to meet some head trauma victims and ask questions about their experiences of life after their accident. We also visited the ICU, the emergency

department for head trauma patients and tried on a lead coat which they are required to wear during inspection of a trauma patient and used the tools they use. This program was a blast and I recommend if anyone gets the chance to attend to take up the opportunity."



P.A.R.T.Y

A group of Year 10 students attended St John of God Hospital, Midland and engaged in the P.A.R.T.Y Program. Although this excursion sounds like fun with such a title, it is in fact far from anything of this nature. Lockridge 50th


